A MESSAGE FROM OUR CO-CHAIRS

The work that women and children do at Auberge Shalom (be it in our shelter, at the Carole & Andrew Harper Counselling Office or through our diverse programming) is in almost all cases an act of **rebuilding**. They are rebuilding healthy boundaries and their self-worth; they are seeking to reestablish a sense of normalcy in a new home, a new neighbourhood. Sometimes they are rebuilding entire social networks.

Thankfully they do not have to do it on their own. We are so proud to be part of such an intricate support system built around the needs of the women and children impacted by intimate partner violence (IPV).

Auberge Shalom itself is continuing to rebuild and stabilize in the wake of the pandemic. In 2022-2023 our ED Search Committee worked diligently to find a new Executive Director to take the reins of this unique organization. It has now been about six months since **Myriam Ariey-Jouglard** began as Executive Director of Auberge Shalom and the decision to bring her on in this leadership role has been validated time and time again. 

IN MEMORY OF ROSLYN PINKER

Staff and Board of Auberge Shalom are deeply saddened by the passing of Roslyn Pinker. A valued and dedicated Board member since 1997, Roz was an outspoken and knowledgeable advocate for women and children affected by intimate partner abuse. Those who knew Roz are aware of how she placed the needs of clients at the center of services and programming, a principle that grounded our organization's evolution over three decades.

Roslyn Pinker was honoured with the title of Director Emeritus at the 2020 Annual General Meeting. This title served to celebrate her innumerable contributions to Auberge Shalom, notably her work in expanding IPV outreach and education in the community and her work on our Physical Space Committee. Increased visibility for Auberge Shalom's services was borne out of this decade of successful outreach work, and Roz fiercely advocated for the opening of an external counselling office to serve the needs of clients who might never enter a shelter. Her work helped make this dream a reality in 2002 and the external services remain in high demand over 20 years later.

Roz had a unique ability to be both forwardlooking and a fount of organizational history. We lost a powerful voice around the table but Roz's warmth, intellect and generosity have left an indelible mark on the lives of so, so many.

NEW DIRECTION

A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It is with great enthusiasm that I share with you this annual report which showcases the hard work, passion, and talent of our beautiful team at Auberge Shalom pour femmes. With just six months under my belt, I continue to be amazed on a daily basis not only by the professionalism of this team but also by their ability to find solutions and get creative in the context of labour shortages and ever-increasing demands. **Our team humbly works to help clients achieve their goals so that they can all have the future they deserve — a future filled with peace and hope.**

We continue to be there for women when they are in crisis: our shelter was able to accommodate **80 women and children** this year and counsellors supported **124 women and children** through our Carole and Andrew Harper Counselling Office. What is more, **Violence Prevention has become an** *essential* **part of our organization**. In 2022-2023 our diverse outreach and prevention initiatives reached nearly **800 people**!

With ever-increasing demands for services, we are enthusiastically embarking on the process of building a strategic plan. We are mobilizing our team as well as our Board of Directors and several partners to reflect on the scope of our mission, the accessibility of our services and our position in the fight against intimate partner abuse in the Jewish community and the community at large. We are building a new vision for Auberge Shalom pour femmes, but one that remains deeply rooted in our traditions and values.

I would like to extend my warmest thanks to our Board of Directors, committee members and volunteers, community partners, governmental and private financial partners, and our generous community of donors. It is thanks to all of you that we are able to create new programs to respond to emerging needs. The next few years promise to be full of exciting projects that we will build and implement together. **Thank you for your trust.**

And to all the women who had the courage to ask for help in spite of the violence they endured, I salute your resilience and your courage.

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
SHELTER

THE SPACE TO REBUILD

In 2022-2023, **32 women** and **48 children** stayed with us in shelter. The shelter team diligently worked to balance comfort and safety, taking consistent measures to ensure the confidentiality of the shelter.

Alongside crisis intervention, staff provided practical support to clients. In 2022-2023, shelter staff reported an increase in mental health issues, significantly fewer community resources available and a high number of clients in financially precarious situations due to inflation.

THE TIME TO STABILIZE

Leila's husband sponsored her move to Canada. When she arrived in Canada the abuse escalated. With multiple children and no formal education, Leila's decision to leave her husband proved to be a steep uphill battle.


Her illiteracy and lack of independence meant **she was not a candidate for second stage housing.** Leila's husband **ruined her credit score** and due to years of isolation and control she did not have any references. Despite the fact that she had no access to money during the marriage, she **inherited a significant debt** from her husband.

Women healing from abusive relationships need not only psychosocial support, but also advocacy to navigate systems. Although an average stay in shelter is under 2 months, Leila stayed in our shelter for 9 months. Her stay in shelter gave her the time to stabilize and benefit from Auberge Shalom's holistic programs and services.

Leila is incredibly resilient. She now has professional training and a job she loves. Leila has a long road of healing ahead of her, but is fighting every day for her rights and to have a better life for her and her children.




STATUS UPON ARRIVAL



Due to increased length of stays and staffing shortages we were forced to turn away 271 women due to lack of space. ASPF collaborates with other shelters, community resources and SOS violence conjugale to ensure that no one is left without the



support they need.

EXTERNAL SERVICES

THE CAROLE & ANDREW HARPER COUNSELLING OFFICE

In 2022-2023 ASPF supported **110** women and **14** children through our external counselling office. Due to **increasing demands** for services and the **complexity of cases**, there was a waitlist for services. Callers, nonetheless, were met with a warm, non-judgmental voice on the line, were provided with referrals when appropriate and were able to access Auberge Shalom's 24/7 support line.

The external services continue to operate within a **hybrid model**. Depending on the needs of our clients, workers provide support by phone, virtually or in-person. Clients continue to express a deep appreciation for the flexibility.


The Carole & Andrew Harper Counselling Office is a vital access point for the orthodox Jewish community and the community at large. But it is also the administrative heart of Auberge Shalom. **The hybrid model also means that we are able to accommodate our growing team to meet ever-growing demands.** The space is constantly morphing from intimate support group set-up to arts and crafts station, to business meeting set-up. Staff work hard to ensure that the office is always client-centred and a welcoming space for women and children impacted by intimate partner abuse.

SUPPORT FOR MOTHERS AND THEIR CHILDREN

Our beautiful children's space, that sat unfinished throughout the pandemic, is not just renewed but wellworn as we close out the 2022-2023 year. In May, staff and Board, guided by Sara Heppner-Waldston, added the finishing touches to the mural. The space is now sunny, playful and filled with hope. With two dedicated childcare workers at the Harper Office, more mothers and children have been seen through our Supporting Resilience Program than ever before. 104 MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

JEWISH COMMUNITY SERVICES

Auberge Shalom honours its mission as we mark another year of offering safe and culturally sensitive counselling and advocacy to Jewish women who have experienced domestic violence. With an increasing proportion of Jewish clients seen in the Harper Office over the past 5 years, we are breaking the silence and stigma around IPV in the Jewish community. At the same time, the community needs around the issue of domestic abuse are rapidly evolving and deeply complex in the aftermath of COVID. Workers report that they are confronting a wide range of intersecting issues (i.e. financial, legal, ghet refusals, post separation abuse, mental health) with limited community resources available.

SUPPORT GROUPS & ACTIVITY CLUB

Auberge Shalom has completed another cycle of empowering and educational **support groups** for women who have experienced intimate partner abuse. In 2022-2023, 20 women benefited from valuable peer support and the psychoeducation provided by our specialized counsellors.

This year, for the first time, Auberge Shalom hosted a **Self-Care Support Group for the orthodox Jewish community.** Having facilitators who are known within the orthodox Jewish community afforded a level of emotional safety and trust for women to take the first step to join the group. **The bonds built in this group were powerful.** Clients bravely shared their experiences and even came together in celebration when participants attained their ghet.

HER STORY. HER PERSPECTIVE. HER JOURNEY.

I called the 24/7 support line and began individual counselling sessions the following week. The sessions helped me realize that I had the resources within me to assert myself and set my limits. Then I took part in the Parenting in the Context of Conjugal Violence Support Group. I hadn't been physically abused, so I felt that I would be different from others. This group helped me to realize that my situation was, in fact, so similar to all the other participants. This freed me from a huge weight that I'd been carrying around without even knowing it was there, hidden under layers and layers of shame. Then I took part in the Healthy Relationships Support Group. I was able to listen more closely to what was said in this second course because, this time, *I* was at the stage of validating the impacts of having been in relationships for so many years with abusers. Learning for the first time what a healthy relationship is and what is unhealthy or toxic made all the difference to me. I must also say that the facilitators made a real difference, both in their competence and in their ability to empathize. It's really a tremendous gift to have access to Auberge Shalom resources. I feel supported, accepted as I am, and that, in turn, helps me to give myself compassion.

Inspired by the Japanese tradition of *kintsugi*, participants in the Healthy Relationships support group created beautiful works of art from broken pottery. The philosophy of *kintsugi* treats breakage and repair as part of the history of an object, as opposed to something to hide.

This is such an apt metaphor for the work that our clients do both in shelter and in our Carole & Andrew Harper Counselling Office. A bowl repaired by *kintsugi* becomes not only whole again, but stronger and more beautiful.

While our clients cannot erase a history of abuse, they can heal and transform.

BUILDING CONNECTIONS

A MESSAGE FROM OUR DIRECTOR OF PROGRAMS

I came back to Auberge Shalom as Director of Programs a year ago with an inspiring mandate : to implement a COVID recovery plan that offers holistic and empowering programming to our clients and to help rebuild community resilience around intimate partner violence through our outreach and prevention work. Reflecting on the year, we have evolved and accomplished so much — it's been a time of reconnection, of learning, and of collaboration.

Auberge Shalom's clients redefined the word resilience in the wake of the pandemic. Their experiences are in line with what the latest research shows about the gendered impact of COVID — that **women are disproportionately affected by economic stress, job loss, interruptions in critical health services, the housing crisis, increased domestic burdens, and lack of access to strong legal representation.** These stark realities pushed us to refresh and rebuild our programming so it is responsive to the new and everchanging needs. To truly address violence against women in our community, we must not only provide holistic and essential services to survivors of IPV, but also work to prevent violence from occurring in the first place. This year, our outreach and prevention strategy focused on building collaborations with schools, summer camps, synagogues, health and social service providers and community groups. Through capacitybuilding workshops, speaking engagements, panel discussions and community conversations we reached almost 800 people and took important strides to address the structural causes of violence against women.

Looking ahead, a focus on early education, healthy relationships and working with men and boys will be powerful strategies to stop violence and abuse. We have hopes of expanding our reach even further, but this isn't something we can do alone ! **Community collaboration sits at the center of our social change work. We invite you to reach out to us if you'd like to start a conversation around preventing IPV in your school, camp, synagogue or community group.**

RESPONDING TO EMERGING COMMUNITY NEEDS



Providing safe shelter, counselling and advocacy to women and children are the foundations of Auberge Shalom's service provision. To affect lasting and meaningful change in society, it is imperative to take a proactive approach. For this reason, **Auberge Shalom has significantly expanded its programming** to fulfill the diversity of client needs and to address the root causes of domestic violence through awareness-raising in the community.

With Client Empowerment Programming,

Auberge Shalom is able to support women in the ways that they need it most. In order to rebuild and gain independence in the wake of intimate partner abuse, clients need to find solid footing. **Client Empowerment Programming helps chip away at the barriers (food insecurity, unemployment, housing, legal representation, etc.) allowing clients the time and space to heal from IPV.**

Discretionary Fund

Provides time-sensitive funds to clients in financially precarious situations to meet their basic and physiological needs.

Milestone Program

Celebrates client achievements and life milestones by supporting their emergence from food insecurity.

Access to Justice Program

Improves the experience of women and their children as they proceed through the family law, immigration or criminal process in the wake of an abusive relationship.

Education Fund

Helps clients move out of the cycle of poverty and closer to fulfilling their educational and employment dreams.

Supporting Resilience Program

Strengthens parenting skills and provides tools to mothers and children to break the cycle of violence.




HOW THESE PROGRAMS SUPPORTED ASPF CLIENTS

OUTREACH & EDUCATION

At Auberge Shalom, we dream of a world where abuse and violence against women ceases to exist, and until such a time we have committed to actively raising awareness on the issue. **ASPF has a long and dedicated history of conducting education and outreach work. No matter the venue or audience, our goal is always the same : to demystify intimate partner abuse while also equipping individuals with tools to support someone in need.** Over the course of 2022-2023 Auberge Shalom prioritized outreach with youth — with a special focus on Jewish Youth. ASPF staff led four workshops in conjunction with b'nai mitzvot programming. They touched on the importance of social justice and the Jewish values of Tikkun Olam. We are so grateful to the congregations that worked our Healthy Relationships workshops into their curriculums! Prevention is the key!




